World renowned livestock scientist and autism educator to visit Tintinara

World renowned livestock behaviour and welfare expert Dr Temple Grandin has chosen Tintinara to deliver a series of workshops to the region in July 2017.

Dr Grandin, a professor of Animal Science at Colorado State University, is a prominent international speaker and author on autism, and her visit is sponsored by the Coorong District Council, Autism SA, Iranda Beef, Regional Development Australia Murraylands/Riverland and Meat and Livestock Australia.

She will spend a week in the town of Tintinara, in the state's Upper South East, from Tuesday, July 18.

Named in 2010 among Time Magazine's 100 most influential people in the world in the 'Heroes' category, Dr Grandin consults widely on issues including livestock handling, equipment, and welfare.



She was also the subject of an award-winning Hollywood movie in 2010, with actress Clare Danes playing the role of Dr Grandin.

Her visit has been organised by Tintinara Regional Area Development Enterprises Incorporated (TRADE), and came as a result of an email from Iranda Beef WHS Coordinator, Erika Materne, asking for advice from Dr Grandin.

TRADE spokeswoman Deanna Dunbar said Iranda Beef's Work Health and Safety Coordinator Erika Materne contacted Dr Grandin to seek her advice on creating an animal handling program to provide staff with training.

"Erika also invited Dr Grandin to visit Tintinara, and she agreed," Mrs Dunbar said.

An in-demand speaker around the world on both autism and cattle handling, with a waiting list of more than two years.

"The town of Tintinara is enormously grateful to Dr Grandin for agreeing to spend a week with us to pass on her vast knowledge and internationally-recognised expertise on managing livestock.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for our community and livestock producers and handlers from all over the state to learn from Dr Grandin, as well as an excellent promotional opportunity for our region.

"Dr Grandin will stay with a local family, and a full week of public and private activities has been organised including an opportunity for families to meet Dr Grandin and speak with her about autism," Mrs Dunbar said.

A welcome lunch will be held On Tuesday, July 18, to start the week of activities, which will include presentations: *Different Minds Create Diverse Communities* (July 19); *Livestock Management Systems* (July 20); *Improving Livestock Handling* (July 21).

Proceeds from events during the week will go towards local community projects and a percentage will be donated to a charity of Dr Grandin's choosing.

She is being hosted by the Tintinara Regional Area Development Enterprise (TRADE) with grant support from the Coorong District Council, who have allocated \$5,000 to the event from their Community Events, Grants and Donations budget.

Mrs Dunbar said the event could not have occurred without the generous support of sponsors and donors.



"This is an amazing opportunity to showcase what our region does best, producing quality livestock," Ms Dunbar said.

TRADE is planning several separate events, including a gala luncheon.

"We hope that strategic alliances will be built with Members of Parliament, primary producers, key local community groups and local government, regional development and other organisations."

Mrs Dunbar said TRADE believed Tintinara had the ability to foster similar programs into the future and saw Dr Grandin's visit as the catalyst for future networking.
