All of the plastic bits above the ground melted – water pipes, wires on electric fences.

Too many phone calls! 90 in the day after the fire.

How many kilometres of fence do you have on your place?

Things that tended to be uninsured – fencing, shedding, grain, livestock.

Business Interruption and Continuation Insurance is very important.

Your insurance policies require regular review – every 12 months.

Asbestos in buildings greatly increases the clean up costs.

There is asbestos in more things than you think.

Chemical masks do not filter out asbestos!

Soon in Australia all fire trucks will be compatible with a Storzts Couplings. Should be considered for being fitted on all fire water tanks.



Can you put one on your water tank? Can a fire truck get within 6 metres of your water tank?

When you arrive at a fire the Fire Appliances can be contacted on UHF 9.

Upon arrival on the fire ground a Farm Fire Unit should call into UHF 9 to register their presence, both for safety reasons and to be covered by CFS Workcover.

When is it OK to stop fighting the fire? It is ok to stop.

If you hear the sirens take cover, a water bomber is about to drop its load!
